## PROTECTING WALKER LAKE

**Drawdown:** Walker Lake received a letter from the PA Department of the Environmental Protection informing us that the outlet drawdown system will have to be inspected in 2019. The system needs to be inspected every 10 years. The last time the drawdown system was inspected was in 2004. The drawdown (temporary lowering) of Walker Lake will take place in September. The lake committee is working with the engineer to obtain a drawdown permit from the PA Fish & Boat Commission.

In connection with the drawdown, a maintenance dredging permit will be submitted to the PA Department of Environmental Protection to allow lakefront property owners to remove sediment from the lake bottom. We will keep you informed of the drawdown process.

**Treatments:** This year, in coordination with our lake consultant, we'll be conducting treatments of water lilies & water shield. If you are lakefront property owner and would like to have water lilies and/or water shield in your area of the lake treated this summer, please provide your contact information to the Walker Lake office by June 15.

**Fishing:** The Lake Committee has conducted fish stocking over the years based on fishery studies completed by our lake consultant. Based on previous fishery surveys, we are recommending that our bass fishery be "catch & release." Catch and release angling practices will preserve the existing population of bass larger than 12 inches, resulting in a steady increase of sizeable largemouth bass.

### PULL THE PLUG ON AQUATIC HITCHHIKERS

- ✓ Clean aquatic plants, zebra mussels, and other prohibited invasive species off watercraft, trailers, and equipment before leaving the water access.
- ✓ Drain water from boat, ballast tanks, portable bait container, and motor before leaving a water access – and drain bilge, livewell, and baitwell by removing drain plugs. **Keep drain plugs out** while transporting boats.
- ✓ Dispose of unwanted bait in the trash. It is illegal to release live bait into the water, or to dump worms on the ground.



To protect our fishery, we need to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species. This starts with all anglers. Check your equipment before leaving any body of water. Inspect every inch of your boat, trailer and fishing gear. Remove and leave behind plants, mud and aquatic life. This helps to avoid bringing aquatic invasive species

into Walker Lake, which can damage equipment and compete with our native species.

**Monitoring:** Finally, as we approach the summer season at Walker Lake, we will continue to monitor the lake's water quality. Let's enjoy the lake this summer!

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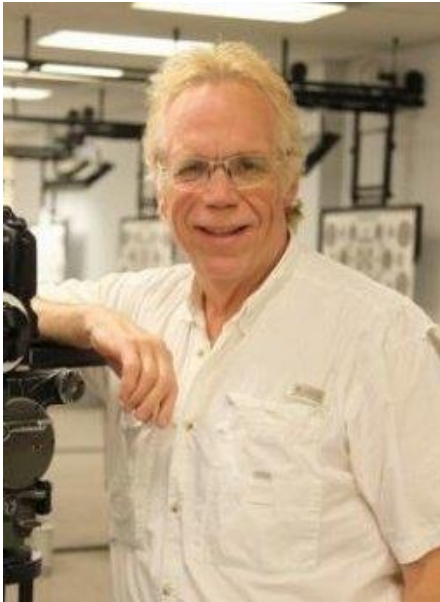

## Brian J. Reynolds – Walker Lake Lensman

*Brian J. Reynolds is a self-taught cinematographer. He began shooting 8 mm movies when he was seven years old. He shot stills for catalogs in his late teens and eventually went on to shoot commercials and numerous music videos. Reynolds got into the camera Guild when he lensed the Jane Fonda exercise tapes. His episodic credits include NYPD Blue, The Closer, 90210, Better off Ted, and Manhattan Love Story, to name a few. His telefilm credits include Dolly Parton's "Coat of Many Colors" and, recently, four movies for Netflix. Reynolds' feature credits include Guarding Tess and Gang Related. Brian has been nominated seven times for his cinematography by the ASC, and twice for the Emmy.*

*We were introduced in a chat room. Months went by before she gave me her phone number. She lived in Pennsylvania and only trusted me when I revealed my mother had been born there. I lived where I grew up and worked: California. I had to go back east to do a movie in Brooklyn, so we agreed to meet in New York. Magic and love happened. Then, I asked her to move in with me in California, which she did, but she made me promise that, if we got "serious," we'd have to move back to Pennsylvania. So, I said "OK, I'll move to Pennsylvania, but I want us to live in a lakehouse."*

That's the story of how Brian and Carol Reynolds, acting President of WLLA and a retired Director of Environmental Affairs at SONY Pictures, came to live at Walker Lake, *and* the historical roots of "Camp Grandma," which the Reynolds' run every summer for Carol's grandchildren, who, otherwise, live in Philadelphia.

How's it going? Now working out of New York, Brian says he's "living in paradise." Warned by one realtor not to select WL because "They have the Red Book," (i.e., "too many rules"), Brian has come to agree with Rory McKean who he remembers at the time saying, "Well, if there are no rules and it's OK to cut the trees down all the way to the lake, it would look like New Jersey."

So Brian is grateful for the rulebook, which, he acknowledges, "could use some tweaking." "It's kept us a little more untouched: peaceful serene, beautiful." He's grateful for the pristine lake on which he can motor in his "floating living room" (i.e., electric pontoon boat) without being tossed overboard by the wake of a jet ski. But, mostly, he's grateful for the friendliness of people around here, like the neighbor who came over with cookies on their first day here some six years ago – "like out of a storybook," was his impression.

Concerning the harsh tones of the controversies arising from the malfeasance of the old WLLA administration, Brian's view is that the divisive tone of politics on the national level has, unfortunately, reflected back on the local level. "We've lost track of sensitivity and kindness in our society – and trust. We're living in a world suffering from a lack of trust: trust in government; trust in each other." A lot of people who have volunteered – who don't get paid – have spent countless time and effort "Putting Humpty-Dumpty back together again," Brian says.

Rather than look back and place blame, Brian argues that we should be focused on solving problems. "We should look ahead and do what we can with what we've got to take care of the place that God has given us to enjoy, to treasure. And we've got a vested interest in at least two ways: our property values and our own self-worth, as members of the community"

Brian J. Reynolds, a cinematographer by profession, attributes his problem-solving orientation in part to working in an expensive milieu. "Every minute lost is thousands of dollars," he says. "If a camera falls off a dolly, I'm not going to stand around asking who failed to secure it properly. I'm going to tell the crew, 'There's another one on the truck. Grab it and let's get on with the job.'" That, in Brian's words, "is the American spirit we all were born with."

But problem-solving also runs in Brian's blood. He's the child of two aerospace engineers who developed space-related gear for NASA. A challenge put to his dad, for example, was: how will people floating in the void of space propel themselves? NASA had the idea of bulky backpacks that wouldn't fit in the tiny space capsules of that time. "Dad had the idea of something like – to use a crude example – two adjustable-arm tubes, each attached at one end to a small CO2 bottle and a manual trigger unit similar to a diver's spear gun."

Visualization – a quality his engineer-parents had, gave Brian another – perhaps the most critical – strength he needed as a filmmaker. "A director hiring a cinematographer is not unlike someone commissioning an artist to do a painting or a musician to compose a concerto. What's required – visually and in other ways – is that the audience be transported from a crowded theater into – for a brief period – the world of the film where they can laugh and cry and understand the good guys and the bad guys."

This takes knowing the techniques that help enable the audience to "suspend its disbelief," and having the tools to employ those techniques. Among the most important techniques, Brian says, is lighting. "When I was a kid, I spent a lot of time looking at the art of ancient masters. These painters were the 'photographers' of their time. They had to know what kind of light and how much would best display their subjects and convey the mood of the painting. I paid special attention to their use of light."

"Cinematography," Brian said in a 2001 interview with *American Cinematographer* magazine, "is about knowing which tools to use and when to use them, and having all that information parked in your brain. ...We're storytellers. The good ones are going to shine, not because they have a bag of tricks or because they know how to use a high def camera, ...but because they know how to tell a story with images and lighting and with heart. It isn't about technical stuff as much as it's about an artistic understanding of how to light actors to tell a story."

Being a cinematographer – more accurately, a director of photography – involves people skills as much as technical and artistic ones. In that 2001 interview, Brian put it this way: "The cinematographer is comparable in a way to the head mechanic in a pit crew for a racecar. You count on your crew. You need people who understand what you want, what your vision is and that your vision is an extension of the director's vision, because that's why he hired you."

Brian will need those problem-solving, visualization and people skills as much as ever as he supports Carol in her new undertaking as WLLA President.


